Research and find out about Plato's Cave. 2. Rewrite, in your own words – Plato's cave story. 3. Explain the analogy of the cave (what does it mean) 4. Create a cartoon which tells the story AND explains the hidden meaning of the story 5. Research Aristotle's four causes 6. Write 4 paragraphs explaining each of the four causes 7. Research the meaning behind The world of Forms – what does that mean? 	
<p align="center">Part Two: Ethics</p> <p>Is it sometimes good to do something bad for a good outcome? Who decides what is 'good'?
